






(C) Brown & Hopps staining bacteria (black arrow) in lung. (D) Lung: low magnification showing the diffuse nature of the pneumonia. (E) Pleura: inflammation extended to the pleura. (F) Degeneration: degenerative neutrophils and necrotic cell debris. (G) Brain of gp91^{-/-} mouse infected with CSF strain: meningeal thickening and histiocyte infiltration-histiocytic meningitis.
